Conformity with accounting standards exposure draft released

The Accounting Professional & Ethical Standards Board (APESB) has released an exposure draft of *APES 205 Conformity with Accounting Standards* as part of its ongoing review and re-launch of professional and ethical standards and invites comments before 19 October 2007.

The proposed standard *APES 205*, expected to be operative from 1 July 2008, will replace the former professional standard *APS 1 Conformity with Accounting Standards and UIG Consensus Views*.

Proposed standard APES 205 sets out the mandatory requirements for members of accounting professional bodies who prepare and present financial reports, as well as those members in public practice who audit, review or compile financial reports.

Ms Kate Spargo, chairperson of the APESB, said a number of changes have been made to the Australian financial reporting framework since APS 1 was issued in 1995.

The changes to the Australian financial reporting framework include the adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in 2005 and the disbanding of the Urgent Issues Group (UIG).

"The Board of Directors have acknowledged these changes in the proposed standard and welcomes stakeholder views on the exposure draft," said Ms Spargo.
